The Minister of Social Welfare, Mr Walker, announced yesterday that a magisterial inquiry would be beld into the case of a 13-year-old Niuean boy who was given shock treatment at Lake Alice Hospital.

He said the inquiry was being made at the request of the Department of Social Welfare because of the serious allegations made about the department's competence to be entrusted with the care and protection of children. Mr Walker expressed his full confidence in the department.

The magisterial inquiry would have access to the full medical records of the boy
